

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ's) for Mr. Eisenberg's Participation in Government Classes.

Q: What do I need in order to be considered "prepared" for class?

A: You need a notebook every day. I recommend loose-leaf. You will need pencil and pen. You can expect to need a pencil for every exam. On occasion, you will be asked to bring the textbook, American Government to class.

Q: I'm a senior. What's your attendance policy?

A: You must be here. Cuts will be reported. Enough said.

Q: OK, I'm in class. Now what do I have to do?

A: The title of the class is Participation in Government. Naturally, in order to get ready to participate in government, you must participate actively in this class. You will receive a participation grade equaling 25% of your grade each marking period. This can be an easy way to help your grade. Naturally, if you do not participate often, or if you disrupt the learning process in some way, it could serve to hurt your grade. Think about it this way, if you don't participate, you'll have to listen to me all day, every day.

Q: Do you give a lot of homework?

A: I do not believe in giving homework just to keep you busy. I only give homework that is part of the curriculum, and that adds to an understanding of our work in class. That having been said, some weeks will require work every night, while other weeks will involve fewer assignments.

Q: How often will we have tests?

A: Major exams will be \approx every 2 weeks. There may be minor quizzes in between, and the occasional surprise!

Q: What about extra help?

A: Extra help is available Mondays and Wednesdays after school.

Q: How will my grade be determined?

A: It will consist of several parts. Test grades count as 60% of your grade, with participation equaling 25%, and homework comprising the remaining 15%.

Q: Why haven't you addressed conduct in class yet?

A: Because you are a senior, and we both know that you know how to behave in class. At this age, failure to behave properly is a choice. A foolish choice, which simply wastes everyone's time.

Q: What will we cover this year?

A: We will examine several things. Certainly, we must look at the structure and rules of U.S. Government. However, as you covered that last year, we will try to avoid overlap whenever possible. More attention will be paid to the ways in which government has an impact on your life, and the ways in which you can have an impact on government.

Q: Will there be a state exam for this course?

A: No. The school requires that I present a final examination, but New York State currently has neither a Regents Exam for Participation in Government, or Economics.

Q: How is my grade for the year determined?

A: Please note that this course is **entirely separate** from the Economics course taken in the other half of the year. The state does not permit us to average the two grades together. Instead, a half-credit is issued for each course, so you must pass **both** courses in order to graduate.

Q: Will we see any films?

A: Yes. As with any other class activity, we only do this if it is going to contribute to understanding the issues being addressed in class. Although I hope you will enjoy these films, it is not the only reason that they will be shown. I have some films in mind, but I will listen to suggestions.

A: Although you may have electronic devices with you, you are not permitted to interrupt class with them. There is no reason that these devices should **ever** go off in class.
